

The size-weight illusion is unimpaired in individuals with a history of congenital visual deprivation

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When we compare two objects of the same weight but different sizes, the larger object feels lighter than the smaller one. This illusion, called the size-weight illusion, is experienced by people even if they have a history of congenital blindness and sight recovery, suggesting that weight is integrated with both haptic and visual size when objects are perceived.

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
